

# AFYAPLUS QUARTER-3 REPORT 2022

### **ABOUT AFYAPLUS**

AFYAPLUS is a not-for-profit organization operating its core development agenda of prevention and control of diseases through promotion of water sanitation and hygiene (WASH) and empowerment of girls and young women. Initially, the organization was established and registered in June 2017 as a Community Based Organization (CBO) operating in Iringa region. Later, in June, 2020 it attained registration as a Non-Governmental Organization (NGO) under the Non-Governmental Organizations Act, No. 24 of 2002 as amended from time to time.

Afyaplus Organization dealing with prevention and control of diseases through Water Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH), adolescent girls and young women empowerment and also sexual reproductive health. The main goal of the organization is to improve school performance and create a community free from diseases caused by lack of safe and clean water, poor sanitation and hygiene and empower adolescent girls and young women in a community.

# GOAL 1: WATER, SANITATION AND HYGIENE (WASH) SERVICES IMPROVED IN SCHOOLS AND COMMUNITY.

A survey revealed that 6% of the schools have no latrines, 84% have no hand washing facilities, 86% have no water for hand washing and 38% of the schools have no water supply. Resolving on the above challenges, Afyaplus organization conduct the following projects namely the safe pad lab and water in schools through construction of hand washing facilities.




Fig 1: Afyaplus board member and afyaplus excutive director during supervision of hand washing facility constructed by Afyaplus at Kibwabwa

#### A .THE SAFE PAD LAB PROJECT

The Safe Pad Lab project is a three year project funded by Malala Fund and implemented in 50 schools within four districts, mention their names are: Iringa Municipal Council, Iringa District Council, Kilolo District Council and Mafinga Town Council. We would like to express our gratitude to Afyaplus team for continuing with implementation of the safe pad lab project within the four districts of Iringa region.

### Objective of the safe pad lab project

The project aims at breaking down the silence attached to menstruation and to build awareness on good Menstrual Hygiene Management (MHM) and Sexual Reproductive Health (SRH).

### **ACTIVITIES AND ACHIEVEMENTS.**

1. Conducting baseline survey in 30 selected schools from four districts namely Iringa municipal, Iringa district council, Mafinga town council and Kilolo District council.

In this reporting period, Afyaplus Organization managed to organize school baseline survey before a project kicks off, with the aim of assessing the understanding of MHM and ASRH issues to school girls, boys and teachers as well as the factors affecting menstruating girls at schools including effects of unimproved MHM to girls in 30 schools of Mafinga Tc, Kilolo district, Iringa district and Iringa Municipal.

The survey focused on measuring students' awareness on MHM and SRH, Source of knowledge, most preferred sanitary pads and its availability in their environment, availability of emergency pads and changing rooms in schools, Presence of water and toilets in schools.

By Understanding various barriers affecting girls at school will help to improve MHM practice among the school girls, sensitize and educate the school management on menstrual hygiene management and requirement of girl friendly toilet, sanitary products and to recommend for the improvement in rural schools.

### The following issues were discovered during baseline survey

 31.29 % of girls responded to lack access on Sanitary materials.

Through this study it was shown that majority of girls worries on how to access sanitary materials hence girls tend to use cloth which ignores safety and hygiene.




Fig 4. Community based trainer Mis. Maria Kidava conducting baseline survey at Tagamenda sec.

"Due to insufficient sanitary materials in our school, many students tend to use old cloth (vikanga) as an option to absorb their menstrual blood. I believe this project will reduce the problem and help girls to absorb menstrual blood in safety and hygiene" said by student from Tagamenda sec school.

 71.11% of schools provide seasonal emergency sanitary pads to their students during menstruation while 28.89% do not provide emergency pads at all.

Majority of teachers reveal that there is no budget allocated for emergency pads rather than seasonal pads distributed as gift by different stakeholder. Students acknowledges the gifts received as they help them during emergency but its availability is not guaranteed.

"It's not a guarantee that emergency pads are always there, the distribution is done if only we receive gifts from different stakeholders especially in the commemoration of menstrual hygiene day so it can be once or twice per year depending on the quantity received, "said by Teacher from Tagamenda secondary school during baseline survey.

### Inadequate changing rooms and incinerators at schools.

In all 30 schools visited 46.67% of schools do not have changing/resting rooms for privacy and soap which cause the 18.26% of school girls to stay at home throughout the menstrual period without attending school.

On the other hand, 53.3% of schools do not have incinerators or place for destroying used sanitary pads hence it result to environmental pollution and destruction of toilet sewage system.

On ASRH, 57.96% of students responded to have knowledge and awareness about puberty and sexuality from school while 42.04 % of students responded to lack knowledge and awareness about puberty and sexuality and this may result to have implications on their health, education as well as their economic development.

2. Conducting MHM awareness session to 17 schools (6 from Iringa district council 6 from Kilolo District council and 5 from Iringa MC).

In this reporting quarter MHM awareness sessions were conducted to 2431 students on issues related to changes puberty, during menstrual importance of good menstrual hygiene relationship and the management between sexual reproductive health and menstrual hygiene management.

### MHM awareness were conducted with the following objectives


- To educate and increase awareness on menstrual hygiene management to adolescent girls in school
- To educate boys on menstrual hygiene and importance of providing peer-support to adolescent and menstruating girls in schools.
- To clear wrong myth attached to MHM
- To support girls in learning and practicing good menstrual hygiene management.

2431 students (1631 girls and 798 boys) from 17 schools of Iringa whereby 1171 students (756 girls and 415 boys) from Kilolo dc, 768 Students (585 girls and 183 boys) from Iringa DC, and 490 students (290 girls and 200 boys) from Iringa Mc.

# 3. Capacity building to school girls and boys on how to produce reusable sanitary pads

In this reporting quarter, Afyaplus has managed to capacitate 30 schools' girls and boys on how to produce reusable pads. Sessions conducted on materials arrangement, material cutting procedures, sewing and buttons pressing/fixing.

#### **B. WATER IN SCHOOLS PROJECT.**

According to research conducted by UNICEF in 2017 effective hand washing behavior may reduce the transmission of infectious diseases by 42%-47%. Afyaplus Organization set a goal of improving water, sanitation and Hygiene (WASH) services in schools through construction of handwashing in schools, conducting awareness sessions, advocate and lobby for support from decision makers. Working towards achieving the Sustainable development goals number 4 and 6, Afyaplus Organization set a goal of improving water, sanitation and Hygiene (WASH) services in schools through construction of handwashing in schools, conducting awareness sessions, advocate and lobby for support from decision makers.

In this reporting quarter Afyaplus organization in collaboration with the government and other WASH GALA stakeholders managed to facilitate promotion of WASH services in schools through construction of hand washing stations in 1 school namely Igumbilo primary.

Through this project a total of students 732 (Male 348 Female 484) will be able to wash their hands frequently and reduce the chance of waterborne infections that can be spread from one person to another through contaminated hands.

"The hand washing facility has been so helpful to our student as they can wash their hands easily and the spent a little time washing their hands and plate because the facility accommodate 9 students at once compared to previous where we had only one water tap" said by head teacher from Kibwabwa primary.

### GOAL 2. ADOLESCENTS GIRLS AND YOUNG WOMEN EMPOWERED TO EXPLOIT THEIR POTENTIALS.

The improve 100 Project is the inclusive project for young girls and women more than 200 especially those who has drop out from school because of different reasons such as pregnant or financial status that led them to continue with school. Improve 100 Cohort3 aims to empower adolescents' girls and young women aged 16-30 with necessary skills which will allow them to explore their capacities and improve their economic status.

In this reporting quarter Afyaplus organization managed to conduct the following activities through IMPROVE 100 project

### 1.Awarding certificate to graduates of IMPROVE 100 Cohort 3 and participate in the official launching of women's forum at Mseke ward

## 2. Launching of the Improve 100 project at Wenda village in Mseke ward.

In Aug 2022 Afyaplus organization in collaboration with government managed to launch the IMPROVE 100 project at Wenda village whereby adolescent girls and young women will be able to be trained in difference areas; such as mindset growth, Adolescent Sexual reproductive health and rights (ASRHR), Menstrual hygiene management (MHM), nutrition, and personal finance management through village savings and loan associations (VSLA).

# 3. Conducting baseline survey to IMPROVE 10 beneficiaries of Wenda Village

# 3. Conducting 2 weeks training on IMPROVE 100 curricula as well as the guideline for Village savings and loan associations (VSLA)

Adolescent girls and young women aged 16-30 were trained on the following issues; mindset growth, sexual reproductive health, nutrition, entrepreneurship and personal financial management through Village Savings and Loans Associations (VSLAs).

### 4. Formulating village savings and loan association groups (VSLAs)

Adolescent girls and young women were capacitated on how to operate and manage Village Loan Savings Associations (VSLAs) through M-KOBA Digital Platform using Mobile Phones together with the importance of VSLA groups in personal Finance Management by saving and access loans with lower interest. Through these sessions one group of VSLA namely Hekima was formulated.


### 5. Conducting supportive supervision to Upendo group

### SUCCESS STORY FROM IMPROVE 100 BENEFICIARY COHORT 3




#### GOAL 3: AFYAPLUS ORGANIZATION CAPACITY IMPROVED.

### 1. Online capacity building.

In line with other activities,7 members of Afyaplus organization were capacitated online on how to develop baseline tools, monitoring and evaluation sessions. The major aim of training was to strengthen staff capacity and effectiveness in the implementation of "The Safe pad lab project".



This training was conducted by external trainers of Monitoring and Evaluation consultancies. Namely, Mr. Avidace and Rashid, the training was for five days and the team were capacitated on different aspect related to program which were M&E overview, selecting indicators, baseline and targets, Evaluation, framework of evaluation. Furthermore, Afyaplus organization has managed to conduct online training based on Online campaign and storytelling session.



Participants where capacitated on making objectives of campaign, identification of beneficiaries, communication modes of reaching out beneficiaries, impacts and goals for the campaign. Also, Afyaplus team members managed to submit the assignments which were given by the trainer.

### Milestone achieved in this quarter

- i) During implementation of Afyaplus projects community, government leader and other stakeholders shows a good cooperation.
- ii) Managed to start implementation of the safe pad lab project in four districts of Iringa region.
- iii) Provision of training on menstrual hygiene management to 2431 students (1631 girls and 798 boys) to 17 schools of Iringa region.
- iv). Purchase of 20 machines and materials of 100 meters for making Reusable Sanitary pads at Jamii Afyaplus.
- v) Through Improve 100 project Afyaplus manage to formulate one group of Village savings and Loans Associations which will allow adolescent girls and young women aged 16-30 at Wenda Village, Iringa DC which will allows adolescent girls and women to access loans with low interest, save money and archive good financial returns.
- vi). Have managed mobilize resource internally and externally and submit 8 project proposal to different donors.
- vii). Manage to complete construction of 1 hand washing facility at Igumbilo primary school

### Challenges

I. Interaction of sessions which leads to failure to reach all students as planned for-instance in schools of Mafinga Tc. Afyaplus has communicated with the respective schools for them to find a way to fix their timetable and share a timetable which will allow community-based trainers to conduct sessions at least once per week.

II. In-adequate rooms for initiating the safe pad labs initiation in some of the proposed schools which leads to changing of schools for labs. In future, there is a need to reconsider construction of rooms for lab initiation.




FIG. 26 QUARTER 3 EXPENDITURES
