GOAL 1: WATER, SANITATION, AND HYGIENE (WASH) SERVICES IMPROVED IN SCHOOLS AND COMMUNITIES

In this reporting quarter, Afyaplus has continued its development agenda of Preventing WASH-related diseases through promoting WASH facilities in Schools, provision of WASH training, and promoting behavior change together with advocacy and lobbying for support from decision-makers for improved WASH services in schools and the communities through the two projects of the safe pad lab and water in schools.

A: THE SAFE PAD LAB PROJECT

The Safe Pad Lab project is a three-year project funded by Malala Fund and implemented in 50 schools within four councils, mention their names are: Iringa Municipal Council, Iringa District Council, Kilolo District Council, and Mafinga Town Council. We would like to express our gratitude to the Afyaplus team for continuing with the implementation of the safe pad lab project within the four districts of the Iringa region.

The objective of the safe pad lab project

The project aims at breaking down barriers school girls face during menstruation and to build awareness of good Menstrual Hygiene Management (MHM) and Sexual Reproductive Health (SRH).

To conduct stakeholder meetings with representatives from school management teams district management and regional management teams.

In this reporting quarter, Afyaplus Organization managed to conduct stakeholder meetings with a school management team to share project success, and challenges, and plan together the way forward. 
Fig 5: Capacity building on Menstrual hygiene management (MHM) and Adolescent sexual and reproductive health (ASRH) conducted to Students of Isakalilo Primary in Iringa Dc.

- To educate boys on menstrual hygiene and the importance of providing peer-support to adolescent and menstruating girls in schools.
- To clear the wrong myth attached to MHM
- To support girls in learning and practicing good menstrual hygiene management.

Establishment of 15 Safe Pads lab in 15 schools of Iringa

In this quarter, Afyaplus has been able to establish the safe pad labs in 15 schools of Iringa (5 schools of Iringa MC,4 schools of Iringa DC, 4 schools of Kilolo DC, and 2 of Mafinga (TC) by supporting these schools with raw materials for producing reusable sanitary pads and 75 machines.

So doing it will help to increase girls' confidence and dignity among school's girls of 52 schools in the Iringa region as the production and access of reusable sanitary pads will increase.

WATER IN SCHOOLS PROJECT

Working towards achieving sustainable development goals number 4 and 6, the Afyaplus organization implements this project which is inclusive for school children with disabilities and it's going to accommodate more than 10000 school children, teachers, and other school workers in the Iringa region. The project is non-funded but is implemented through funds generated on fundraising event called Afyaplus WASH GALA.

In this reporting quarter, the Afyaplus organization through the water in school project has been able to achieve the following progress.

To cultivate behavior change among school boys and girls through the construction of hand washing stations in two schools namely Igingilanyi and Igumbilo primary

This project is going to serve a total of 1263 students (565 boys and 698 girls) whereby 832 students (348 boys and 484 girls) are from Igumbilo primary school and 431 (217 boys and 214 girls) are from Igingilanyi Primary and will be able to wash their hands frequently and reduce the chance of WASH-related infections that can be spread from one person to another through contaminated hands.

Provision of education on good sanitation and hygiene practices

During this quarter, the organization managed to provide education on good sanitation and hygiene practices to 1263 students (boys 565 and girls 698) whereby 832 students (boys 348 and 484 girls) are from Igumbilo primary school and 431 (boys 217 and 214 girls) are from Igingilanyi Primary.

GOAL 2. ADOLESCENTS GIRLS AND YOUNG WOMEN EMPOWERED TO EXPLOIT THEIR POTENTIAL TO THE MAXIMUM

The Improve 100 project includes more adolescent girls and women more than 200 especially those who have dropped out of school due to different reasons such as pregnancy or financial status. Improve 100 Cohort 3 aims to empower adolescent girls and young women aged 16-30 with the necessary skills which will allow them to explore their capacities and improve their economic status.

In this reporting quarter, Afyaplus organization manages to conduct the following activities through Improve 100 project.

To empower adolescents' girls and young women aged between 16-30 In this quarter, 12 adolescent girls and young women aged 16-30 were empowered in different areas on the following issues; mindset growth, sexual reproductive health, nutrition, entrepreneurship, and financial management through Village Savings and Loans Associations (VSLAs) These sessions have improved their mindset, economic status as well as increased on decision-making power at household level and the community as whole.

Enhancing capacity for personal financial management through village savings and loan associations (VSLA) among adolescent girls and young women.

Adolescent girls and young women were capacitated on how to operate and manage Village Loan Savings Associations (VSLAs) through the M-KOBA Digital Platform using Mobile Phones together with personal Finance Management through Village Loan Savings Association (VLSA) by saving and accessing loans with lower interest.

By so doing, the saving behavior of adolescent girls and young women will improve as their chance for saving will increase due to the availability of Village Savings and Loan associations in their community. As a success of this activity, a group of 12 members called Hekima was formulated.


Figure 17. Afyaplus Project officer Ms. Catherine Peter, briefing ward education officer of Kilolo DC on the projects that AfyaPlus Org. implement to the society during the commemoration of World toilet at Kichangani grounds.
