All visitors together with the Afyaplus team got a chance to visit two schools in the region, including Isimani Secondary School and Isimila Secondary School of Iringa DC, to see and learn how safe pad labs operate in schools and how it has impacted student lives.

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Through visiting the safe pad labs other Malala grantees got a chance to learn how labs operate in schools and they can use available resources on their areas to implement the same project and remove barrier girls facing during menstruation both in school and out of school.

Furthermore, other Malala grantees and a Malala Country Director got a chance to learn and hear how the project impacted the lives of students through discussions with students and their teachers. It was found that student attendees and performance have increased because girls' confidence and dignity have been restored together with access to reusable sanitary pads at the school level.
