GOAL 1: WATER, SANITATION, AND HYGIENE (WASH) SERVICES IMPROVED IN SCHOOLS AND COMMUNITIES

Afyaplus Organization has continued with its development agenda of prevention and control of WASH-related diseases by promoting the construction of WASH facilities in Schools, provision of WASH training to promote behavior change together with advocacy and lobbying for support from decision-makers, other WASH stakeholders, and the community as a whole for improved WASH services in schools and the communities. The mentioned interventions have been achieved through the implementation of the Safe pad lab project and the Water in School project.

UNICEF MHM Report of 2022, prevails that 16.8 percent of students missed school during menstruation due to many reasons such as lack of menstrual hygiene materials, fear of embarrassment in case of visible stains on the cloth, lack of changing rooms, Lack of clean and suitable toilet facilities.

A: THE SAFE PAD LAB PROJECT

The safe pad lab project is a three-year project funded by Malala Funds and implemented in 52 schools within four councils, mention their names are: Iringa MC, Iringa DC, kilolo DC, and Mafinga TC. We would like to express our gratitude to the Afyaplus team and other stakeholders for continuing to implement the safe pad lab project within the four districts of the Iringa region. The project aims to break down school girls' barriers during menstruation and build awareness of good Menstrual Hygiene Management (MHM) and Adolescent sexual reproductive health and rights (ASRHR).

The project employs various interventions, such as awareness sessions on MHM and ASRH, and capacity-building workshops on how to produce reasonable sanitary pads.

ACTIVITIES AND ACHIEVEMENTS

To conduct awareness sessions on adolescent sexual reproductive health and rights (ASRH) and Menstrual Hygiene Management (MHM) to 31887 students (14930 boys and 16874 girls) from 46 schools of Iringa.


Afyaplus organization is working with community-based trainers, school teachers, and other government officials and through this collaboration has managed to conduct awareness sessions on adolescent sexual reproductive health and rights (ASRH) and good menstrual hygiene management (MHM).

In this reporting quarter, Out of 31887 students reached, a total of 9828 students (boys 4624 and 5204 Girls) are from Kilolo DC, 9544 students (boys 4465 and girls 5079) from Iringa Mc, 8339 students (boys 3818 and girls 4521) from Iringa DC, and 4093 students (boys 2023 and girls 2070) are from Mafinga Tc.

To conduct post survey in 29 schools of Iringa region to access understanding on Menstrual Hygiene Management (MHM) and Adolescent and Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights (ASRHR).

After successfully completing our sessions in 46 schools in all districts, we conducted a post-survey to assess the understanding of Menstrual Health Management (MHM) and Adolescents and Sexual Reproductive Health and Rights (ASRHR) issues among school girls, boys, and teachers as well as the factors affecting menstruating girls at schools including the effects of unimproved MHM on girls from 25 schools of Mafinga TC, Kilolo DC, Iringa DC, and Iringa MC.

To conduct capacity building of sewing reusable sanitary pads to 1154 students from 12 schools of Iringa region.

As a mechanism to improve access to quality sanitary products 1154 students (138 boys and 1016 girls) from 12 schools were capacitated on how to sew reusable sanitary pads. Out of 1154 students reached a total of 232 students were Girls from Kilolo DC, 382 students (boys 10 and girls 372) from Iringa Dc, 450 students (boys 114 and girls 336) from Iringa MC, and 90 students (boys 14 and girls 76) are from Mafinga Tc.

LESSON LEARNT

1. Access to affordable and quality reusable pads contributes a lot to improving school girls' health, retention, and performance.

MILESTONE ACHIEVED

1.76% of the targeted students which is equal to 1154 students (138 boys and 1016 girls) from 12 schools were capacitated on how to sew reusable sanitary pads.

B. WATER IN SCHOOLS PROJECT

In efforts to achieve sustainable development goals number 4 and 6, the Afyaplus organization implements a project that is inclusive for school children and profits more than 10000 school children, teachers, and other school workers in the Iringa region. The project funds depend on the fundraising events called Afyaplus WASH GALA, the main contributors are individuals, other WASH stakeholders, institutions, and business owners from Iringa Region. In this reporting quarter, the Afyaplus organization through the water in school project has been able to achieve the following progress.

To promote WASH services in schools through the construction of hand washing stations in 4 schools services in schools through the construction of hand washing stations in 4 schools

Funds raised during Afyaplu's third WASH Gala enabled the organization to construct hand washing stations in 3 secondaries namely Miyomboni, Mkwawa, Kalenga, and 1 primary school namely Kalenga.

The project is going to serve 2909 students (1228 boys and 1681 girls), teachers, and other workers. Out of 2909 students, 528 (236 boys and 292 girls) were from Kalenga Primary School, 918(375 boys and 543 girls) were from Kalenga secondary school,545 (242 boys and 303 girls) from Miyomboni secondary school, and 918 (375 boys and 543 girls) from Mkwawa secondary school.

Provision of education on good sanitation and hygiene practices

During this quarter, the organization managed to provide education on good sanitation and hygiene practices to students 545(boys 242, and girls 303) from Miyomboni secondary school in Iringa Municipal. The major aim of this session was to raise awareness and cultivate behavior change among school boys and girls.

GOAL 2. ADOLESCENTS GIRLS AND YOUNG WOMEN EMPOWERED TO EXPLOIT THEIR POTENTIAL TO THE MAXIMUM.

In an attempt to empower Adolescent girls and young women, the Afyaplus organization implements IMPROVE 100 project which is an inclusive project for young girls and women especially those who have dropped out of school due to different reasons such as pregnancy or financial status. The project imparts the necessary skills and knowledge that allow them to explore potentials, and opportunities, and improve their economic status.

In this reporting quarter, Afyaplus Organization managed to conduct the following activities through IMPROVE 100 project.

i. To conduct share-out distribution sessions in the Furaha and Upendo group of Tanangozi.

In this quarter Afyaplus Organization was able to visit the beneficiaries of the Improve 100 project present in the Furaha, Upendo, and Hekima groups to conduct a share-out distribution session in the Furaha and Upendo groups of Tanangozi. In line with that Afyaplus team managed to explore the challenges in operating and managing the group as well as the success achieved so far.

Menstrual Hygiene Campaign to school students

In addition to our regular sessions, we also celebrated World Menstrual Health Hygiene Day by Organizing an awareness campaign in schools to promote Menstrual Hygiene Management and awareness on Menstrual Health Hygiene Day, which is celebrated on May 28 yearly. We successfully engaged with two schools, Ipogolo Secondary, and Kalenga Secondary, as part of this initiative.

We recently conducted a campaign at Kalenga Secondary School on May 30th, were 362 members (180 women and 182 men) were reached and empowered on menstrual hygiene management (MHM) and adolescent sexual and reproductive health and rights (ASRHR) for parents and caregivers. It is essential to educate parents about MHM and ASRHR as it empowers them to support their children's growth and well-being. Parents and caregivers, being the primary contacts for their children, play a crucial role in this regard.

It was an excellent opportunity for us to showcase our projects specifically the Safe Pad lab project and how it has played a great role in promoting and minimizing challenges facing school girls during Menstruation which is being implemented in the Iringa region.

The theme of this year was "Menstruation is a fundamental and essential aspect of health for girls and women. <u>#Let'sEmpower</u>" and the guest of honor was the Deputy Minister for Health Dr. Godwin Mollel (MP).

- To remind and create awareness to parents and care givers on proper way of guiding their children and helping them in their menstruation.

Capacity building training.

Afyaplus organization successfully conducted capacity-building training for nine (9) staff. The primary objective of this undertaking was to enhance the proficiency and efficacy of Afyaplus staff in the areas of project writing skills, project management, and resource mobilization. By honing these skills, the training aimed to empower the staff to produce exceptional project documents that would be instrumental in generating compelling grant proposals and acquiring resources.

This training was conducted by the external trainer Mr. Constantine Shirati, Project Management consultant for three days training from 26-28, June 2022 at Afyaplus office.

MILESTONE ACHIEVED



- 2. Through this session Afyaplus team managed to know in detail on how to develop sound project titles and objectives, that is very clear and understandable from first site.
- 3. The Afyaplus team know to develop, the clear project back group with the recent information.

MILESTONES ACHIEVED IN THIS QUARTER

- 1. Afyaplus Organization has successfully constructed four hand washing stations in Miyomboni Secondary, Kalenga Secondary, Mkwawa Secondary, and Kalenga Primary School. and hand over two hand washing stations in Miyomboni secondary school and in Kalenga secondary school.
- 2. The Afyaplus organization managed to capacitate 76% of students which is equal to 1154 students (138 boys and 1016 girls) from 12 schools with skills and knowledge of how to make reusable sanitary pads.
- 3. The Afyaplus organization managed to conduct awareness sessions for 31887 students (14930 boys and 16874 girls) from 46 schools regarding good menstrual hygiene management (MHM) and Adolescent sexual reproductive and health (ASRH) issues.
- 4. We have accomplished a significant milestone by effectively coordinating and executing a campaign focused on raising awareness about Menstrual Hygiene Management. Our efforts were centered around Menstrual Hygiene Management Day, observed annually on May 28th, targeting school students, parents, and caregivers. Notably, we successfully reached out to Ipogoro Secondary School, Kalenga Secondary School, as well as the parents and caregivers in the Ulanda ward.
- 5. Afyaplus has accomplished a significant milestone by organizing a successful share-out distribution session for both the Upendo Group, consisting of 22 members and the Furaha Group, comprising 17 members in Tanangozi Village. This annual event serves as the crowning moment of their financial cycle. Additionally, it's worth noting that these groups have already commenced a fresh financial cycle.
- 6.In Order to strengthen the organization's growth. We have successfully hired two skilled interns who will greatly strengthen our finance and monitoring & evaluation departments. Their valuable contributions will improve our operations and help us succeed.
- 7. We have accomplished a significant milestone by organizing a training program focused on enhancing the skills of our staff in project writing, project management, and resource mobilization. This training will prove invaluable in enabling our team to prepare and create outstanding grant proposals, as well as effectively mobilize resources.


