

Here are some key highlights: The construction of two hand washing stations in two secondary schools including Irole and Ismani which brings the total number of 40 schools reached by this project, the establishment of School Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (SWASH) clubs in twelve schools in Iringa MC, an important component of our educational initiatives. Also, continue to monitor and evaluate our safe pad lab project operating in schools.

Also in partnership with the Malala Fund, we managed to organize Girls Vision for Education workshops in Iringa and Pwani Region: This program empowers girls and young women to redefine their educational experiences both in-person. We have reached 30 young girls, both in and out of school, gathering valuable insights and thoughts to help them achieve their educational dreams.

We are thrilled to welcome our new partner EWB USA, to support the Water Station Installation Project in Mangalali Village, Iringa District. This project will establish water stations in schools, health centers, and residential areas, significantly improving access to clean and safe water.

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ABOUT AFYAPLUS ORGANIZATION



The main goal of the organization is to improve school performance and create a community free from diseases caused by lack of safe and clean water, poor sanitation, and hygiene and empower adolescent girls and young women in a community.

GOAL 1: WATER, SANITATION, AND HYGIENE (WASH) SERVICES IMPROVED IN SCHOOLS AND COMMUNITIES

The Afyaplus Organization has continued to advance the ultimate goal of the organization's development agenda of improving WASH services in schools and communities, leading to long-term strength and comfort for students and their families. By focusing on preventing and controlling WASH-related diseases through targeted initiatives, the organization aims to create sustainable improvements in health outcomes, educational attainment, and gender equality. Through its work, the organization contributes to achieving Sustainable Development Goal 4: Quality Education and Goal 6: ensuring access to water and sanitation for all by 2030.

Despite global recognition that clean water and sanitation are basic human rights, many people still lack access to these essential resources. In Tanzania, the Constitution acknowledges the human right to water and sanitation, and national plans emphasize the importance of equitable access to quality WASH (Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene) services (UNICEF WASH report 2020). However, poor sanitation and hygiene conditions remain prevalent, amplifying the occurrence of preventable illnesses such as cholera, which frequently causes severe diarrhea and dehydration.

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A: THE SAFE PAD LAB PROJECT

Afyaplus organization with the support of the Malala Fund is implementing a three-year project called the Safe Pad Lab Project in 52 schools within four councils; Iringa MC, Iringa DC, Kilolo DC, and Mafinga TC. The project aims to break down barriers facing school girls' during menstruation by employing various interventions, such as awareness sessions on MHH and ASRHR, establishing safe pad laboratories, and providing capacity-building workshops on how to produce reusable sanitary pads through established reusable sanitary pad laboratories in 15 schools in the Iringa region. We would like to express our gratitude to the Afyaplus team and other stakeholders for continuing to implement the safe pad lab project within the four districts of the Iringa region.

ACTIVITIES AND ACHIEVEMENTS

Session on making reusable sanitary pads

To effectively produce reusable sanitary pads, students involved in Menstrual Health Hygiene (MHH) and Adolescent Sexual and Reproductive Health and rights (ASRHR) acquire a range of skills. These skills includes Technical Skills, Sewing, and Fabric Handling, whereby students need to learn basic sewing techniques, including stitching, cutting, and pattern making. They should be familiar with different types of fabrics, their properties, and how to choose the right fabric for sanitary pads.

Monitoring the progress of safe pad labs established

Furthermore, in this reporting period, the Afyaplus team has managed to conduct follow-ups on the 14 established safe pad laboratories to see the project's progress and its impacts on the students. It was discovered that the five schools that completed their sessions are now producing their pads and distributing them to school girls. So far 775 pads have been produced and distributed to 258 school girls.



B. WATER IN SCHOOLS PROJECT

The Water in School project aims to contribute to sustainable development goals number 4 (quality education) and 6 (clean water and sanitation) by implementing a WASH initiative that is includes for school children and benefits a total of 24,208 school children, teachers, and other school workers in the Iringa region. This project aims at improving access to clean and safe water by constructing hand washing station in schools and providing sanitation and hygiene education. The Water in School project is an initiative implemented by the Afyaplus organization with the specific goal of protecting the school community from WASH-related diseases.

According to CDC report of 2021, handwashing with soap can reduce the risk of respiratory infections by up to 16%. Therefore, Afyaplus organization promote good hygiene practices by building hand washing stations that will allow students to wash their hands regularly which will reduce the risk of illness and infection from WASH related diseases.

ACTIVITIES AND ACHIEVEMENTS

Preliminary assessment of sanitation and hygiene situation in Iringa schools

in this reporting quarter the Afyaplus organization in collaboration with the school management team, was able to conduct a simple survey to capture and assess the current situation of access to clean water and sanitation facilities, as well as hygiene practices, in two secondary schools of Irole and Isimani.

The following are the findings of the survey conducted at 2 mentioned schools above

01. Irole secondary school.

The situation at Irole Secondary School highlights a critical issue regarding the inadequate provision of sanitation facilities, specifically access to clean and safe water for handwashing. With 681 students in total and only one water tap available, it is evident that the current infrastructure is insufficient to serve the needs of all students effectively. The imbalance in the number of girls (370) and boys (311) further exacerbates the problem, as more students are competing for limited resources.

02. Isimani Secondary School,

The water infrastructure is severely inadequate, with only one water tap available for 1067 students and their teachers. This situation poses a significant challenge as the limited water supply is insufficient to meet the needs of the school population. The disparity in the number of girls (724) and boys (343) further exacerbates the issue, as it indicates a higher demand for water facilities among female students.

Promoting good hygiene practices in schools can have a significant impact on public health outcomes. By teaching students proper hygiene habits early on, schools contribute to reducing the spread of infectious diseases, improving overall well-being, and fostering a culture of cleanliness because schoolchildren will carry and share the acquired knowledge with their families and the community as a whole.

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Construction of hand washing facilities in two Secondary Schools from Kilolo DC and Iringa DC

In the second quarter of 2024, the Afyaplus organization successfully constructed two hand-washing stations at Irole Secondary School in Kilolo DC, and Isimani Secondary School in Iringa MC. The construction is ongoing, with more than 70% completed. Each station will have eight water taps upon completion. The aim is to provide students with readily available and accessible handwashing stations, promoting regular handwashing and reducing the spread of germs and diseases. The station will comprise 8 water taps that will be used by students and will benefit a total of 1738 students (1080 girls and 658 boys).

In this scenario, the completion of these hand-washing facilities in two schools will make a total of 40 schools reached by this project and is going to serve a total of 24,208 students, comprising 12,995 girls and 11,213 boys. The importance of proper handwashing practices cannot be overstated, especially in educational settings where large numbers of individuals gather daily. Effective hand hygiene is crucial in preventing the spread of infectious diseases and promoting overall health among students and staff.

Establishment of Afyaplus SWASH Clubs in 12 Schools

In this quarter, Afyaplus has managed to establish Afyaplus SWASH (school, Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene) clubs in 12 Schools located in both primary and secondary schools within the Iringa Municipal Council area. These clubs aim to instill lifelong habits and foster a culture of cleanliness. By targeting multiple schools, we strive to maximize our impact and provide young individuals with essential education on sanitation and hygiene practices.








The SWASH Clubs are designed to empower students with the knowledge and skills they need to maintain good hygiene, both at school and at home. Through engaging activities and interactive sessions, we help students understand the critical role proper sanitation plays in their health and well-being. This initiative mitigates the risks associated with poor sanitation, such as outbreaks of waterborne and hygiene-related diseases. These sessions by Afyaplus community-based trainers who significant role in moderating the activities of these clubs. We are privileged to receive positive feedback from both school management and students.

The following is the list of schools where the Afyaplus **SWASH** introduced clubs were and formulated collaboration with the school management

The SWASH clubs were formulated in 6 primary schools which are Kigonzile, Ukombozi, Igeleke, Mtwivila, Igumbilo, and Kibwabwa together with 6 secondary schools which are Mkwawa, Mivinjeni, Miyomboni, Kleruu, Ipogolo, and Mtwivila. Out of 12 SWASH clubs established a total of 299 students (184 girls and 115 boys) from 5 schools were reached with the sanitation and hygiene sessions. Below is a graph that shows the distribution of students reached on sanitation and hygiene sessions conducted per school.

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GIRLS VISION FOR EDUCATION PROGRAM

The Girls Vision program is a global initiative that provides both inperson and online consultations, empowering girls and young women to redefine education. Through this program, participants are equipped, connected, and encouraged to turn their educational visions into reality.

The platform fosters a global imagination exercise where girls and young women collectively create their vision for education, amplifying their voices and agendas in the educational debate, especially from marginalized communities. This serves as a springboard for a global movement of girls and young women advocating for their education.







In June, we conducted incredible workshops where inspiring girls shared their perspectives on their academic journeys, and the systems they need to achieve their educational goals without interruptions.

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With the help of Girls Vision for Education facilitators, Afyaplus successfully hosted 6 in-personal workshops for 30 girls and young women who are in and out of school. This initiative reached three districts: Iringa DC and Kilolo DC in the Iringa region, and Mkuranga DC in the Pwani region. The program empowers girls and young women to redefine their educational experiences through in-person workshops. We are thrilled to be part of this global movement of amplifying marginalized voices and striving for educational equity. The workshop was a huge success! The girls provided valuable insights, bringing us closer to making their educational dreams a reality.

In school workshops

Three workshops for students aged 10-13 and 15-17 were successfully conducted. These workshops provided a platform for girls and young women to share and envision what education should look like by imagining the current situation, analyzing the hindering factors, and developing a vision for an improved educational experience. This vision will be used as an advocacy tool to empower girls' education journey. Through these efforts, 3 workshops were conducted in 3 schools; Isimani Primary School in Iringa DC, reaching 5 pupils; Dundani Secondary School in Mkuranga DC, reaching 5 students; and Mwinyi Secondary School in Mkuranga DC, reaching 5 students.







Three workshops were conducted for in-school students and pupils, reaching 15 participants in Iringa DC and Mkuranga, as part of the Girls Vision for Education program.

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Out school workshops

We have managed to conduct three workshop meetings with girls and young women aged 16-19 living in rural areas who are out of school due to various challenges they have faced in their academic journeys. These workshops provided a platform for participants to share their experiences and envision an ideal education system. Out-of-school girls reflected on their past education experiences; analyzed the factors influencing them and developed a vision for an improved educational experience. One workshop was held in Wenda Ward in Iringa DC, reaching five girls and young women, and two workshops were held in Lulanzi Village in Kilolo DC, engaging ten girls and young women.







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In Tanzania, the national celebration took place in Arusha, bringing together various MHH stakeholders to underscore the importance of this day. The event was honored by the Deputy Minister for Health, Hon. Godwin Mollel (MP), who stressed the significance of parents and guardians specifically male parents to consider girls' needs and in discussions surrounding participate menstrual health. the establishment of period-friendly infrastructure in schools, and access affordable reusable pads. He highlighted that education on Menstrual Health Hygiene (MHH) and Adolescent Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights (ASRHR), along with increased investment in these areas, is essential for the well-being of young girls.

Afyaplus Organization, represented by the Program Coordinator, proudly celebrated World Menstrual Hygiene Day in Arusha. The organization has been at the forefront of promoting menstrual health through various initiatives, including the Safe Pad Lab Project aiming to dismantle the barriers schoolgirls face during menstruation and enhance awareness on good MHH and ASRHR practices.

The Safe Pad Lab Project has reached 35,000 schoolgirls, surpassing its initial goal of 30,600. Operating primarily in Iringa, we have successfully implemented our menstrual initiatives in 62 schools. Empowerment begins with education, and our efforts focus on breaking the stigma around menstruation, advocating for accessible facilities, and providing affordable menstrual products.

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Advocating for Educational Reform: Afyaplus Contributes to National Committee Review

On June 26, Mr. Emmanuel Gilbert from the Afyaplus team had the honor of representing our organization at the National Committee for the Review of the Education Act, hosted by the Tanzania Education Network (TENMET) at the Sheraton Hotel in Dar es Salaam.

We shared crucial insights on necessary changes, inclusivity in girls' education, and child protection and safeguarding. Key issues we presented for consideration included incorporating a re-entry policy in the act, tax exemption for sanitary pads, leveraging ICT in teaching and learning processes, continuous professional development for teachers, removal of corporal punishment in favor positive disciplinary measures, declaring education fundamental human right, and emphasizing the provision of quality education in schools. We are grateful for the opportunity to advocate for these positive changes and contribute to the advancement of education in Tanzania.

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MILESTONES ACHIEVED IN THIS QUARTER


- Afyaplus has successfully established, 12 Afyaplus SWASH Clubs 1. and conducted awareness training for a total of 299 students, including 115 boys and 184 girls, from 12 schools of Iringa Municipal Council in the Iringa region.
- Afyaplus has attained a significant milestone in this second 2. quarter in partnership with Engineer Without Borders USA. Expect to collaborate on the Water Station Project in Mangalali Village where 95% of the project cost will be funded by an Engineer Without Borders USA while 5% will be community contribution to ensure project sustainability. The Water Station Project will make tangible progress towards addressing challenges of water accessibility in Mangalali Village.
- 3. Through the Water in Schools project, in this second quarter, Afyaplus organization has successfully constructed two hand washing facilities in 2 schools which are Irole Secondary School and Isimani Secondary School. The hands washing facility is expected to serve a total of 1738 students (658 boys and 1080 girls). The hand-washing stations make a total of 15 stations constructed that will be added to the previously 25 schools and bring a general number of 40 schools reached by the water-inschool project.


